Notes to the Financial Statements
For the year ended 30 June 2020

Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act of Queensland. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(b) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(c) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expens as the Association is not registered for GST.

(d) Accruals

Accruals represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received or committed by the association during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability. The Accruals at the end of the reporting period were the remaining costs associated with the website construction \$3,751.44 and Audit fees \$330.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Opinion

QSA AFFILIATED CLUBS

QSA has approximately 600 members but not all are members of affiliated clubs. The following affiliated clubs are present within the QSA area of operation;

- Sunshine Coast Sports Aviators Inc situated on the Sunshine Coast with flying sites from Rainbow Beach & Widgee in the north/north west to Woody Point on the Redcliffe Peninsula.
- Canungra HGC situated at Canungra in the Gold Coast hinterland with a number of hinterland sites. CHGC is one of our original and most successful clubs and is actively involved in competition flying for HG and PG disciplines.
- Toowoomba HGC/Wicked Wings/Killarney based west of Brisbane with a range of inland sites covering most wind directions. They also have access to a private airstrip which is used extensively for ground tow launching.
- Paradise Flyers PPG club are based on the Gold Coast and have sites ranging from Jacobs Well, through the Gold Coast to northern NSW and out to Boonah.
- Surf & Turf Flyers is a newer PPG club based at Atkinson Dam west of Brisbane. They run the popular Propfest event.
- Dalby HGC a small but energetic club based in Dalby and they run the immensely popular Dalby Big Air annual HG event.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Audited financial statements for the 2019/2020 financial year are appended to this report.

ACTIVITIES REPORT

QSA historically and currently does not take an active position in the day to day operation or management of SAFA flying disciplines. The affiliated clubs in the QSA area of operation actively manage this function which includes the following activities;

- Safety matters, including recruiting and installing AIRS Managers and Safety Officers
- Site management and flying administration
- National site guide contributions/updates
- Promotional activities and participation in community events
- Training workshops such as VHF radio clinics and parachute re-pack days.
- Competitions
- Member engagement and development activities
- Management of key stakeholder relationships

QSA receives RDL levies collected by SAFA. Traditionally these levies, less QSA operating costs, have been passed back to local clubs to be used as the clubs see fit for the benefit of their members.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

Once structured to do so, QSA does intend to take an active position in establishing and managing key stakeholder relationships at the Qld State Government level. This is essential to ensure our sports infrastructure needs are able to facilitate the growth of our sport. We also need to ensure we are positioned to benefit from any funding arrangements that may be applicable for our needs.

QSA may also become active in promoting our disciplines across our regional area at such events as rural agricultural shows.

Increasing and/or revitalizing our club presence in the area from Bundaberg to Rockhampton and west is also a future priority for QSA.

Some constitutional change is required to position QSA to pursue these aims and this is planned to progressively take place over the next year or two.

- 1. **Opening of Meeting** A quorum being present, the President declared the meeting open at 7.00pm & called for apologies & proxies.
 - There were no apologies or proxies.
- 2. **Minutes of previous AGM** Secretary Paul Reilly read the minutes of the previous AGM held 14th Oct 2019.

Moved: Paul Reilly, that the minutes of the previous AGM be accepted as a true & correct record.

Seconded: Paul Green & carried.

Business Arising from the 2019 AGM minutes: It was noted that the following matters raised at the 2019 AGM had been progressed and/or resolved during the year;

- Establishment of the QSA website and email capability. Both are up and running and the website has received favourable commentary from various quarters.
- Contingency funding this was implemented by the Treasurer and enabled QSA commitments to be met.
- SAFA representative Paul Green was appointed to the SAFA Board.
- SAFA Affiliation requirements All clubs in QSA's area of operation were followed up and met their SAFA affiliation requirements.
- Distribution of QSA RDL funds to affiliated clubs work to facilitate this commenced during the 2019/20 financial year. Clubs were engaged during this process to ensure a transparent and accountable process. The actual distribution of funds to affiliated clubs does not reflect in the 2019/20 financial reports because it occurred in the current financial year and will be reflected in the 2020/21 accounts.
- Annual Report President John Vasta presented the 2019/20 annual report.
 Moved: John Vasta that the annual report be accepted by the meeting.
 Seconded: Paul Reilly & carried.
- 4. Audited Financial reports: Treasurer Allan Hutchinson presented the audited financial reports for the 2019/2020 Financial Year (FY). The audit report reflected accurately the financial position and FY history of the Association. There were no issues raised by the auditor.

6. Appointment of Auditor for 2020/21 Financial Year:

- 7. Special resolution 1: At a special general meeting held 30th May 2019, members of the incorporated association 'the Hang Gliding Federation of Australia' (HGFA) voted to adopt a new governance structure (a Company Limited by Guarantee) and a new name 'the Sports Aviation Federation of Australia' (SAFA). Accordingly QSA Management Committee recommends by way of special resolution that;
 - The QSA Inc rules be amended to reflect the change of name of the HGFA to the SAFA by noting in;
 - 1. Interpretation (1) In these rules- Any/all reference to the Hang Gliding Federation of Australia (HGFA) is a reference to the Sports Aviation Federation of Australia (SAFA).

The President called for a vote and **Special Resolution 1** was passed unanimously.

- 8. **Special Resolution 2:** The QSA Inc wishes to increase its Management Committee reach and capacity by including at least one member nominated by each affiliated club in the State (as defined) geographic area of operation. Accordingly the QSA Management Committee recommends;
 - That clause 18 Membership of management committee (1), be amended to read:
 - The management committee of the association consists of a president, treasurer, and at least one member proposed by each SAFA affiliated club in the QSA Inc State (as defined) geographic area of operation, and any other members the association members elect at a general meeting.
 - That clause 21 Vacancies on management committee (1), be amended as follows;
 - 1) If a casual vacancy happens on the management committee, the continuing members of the committee may appoint another member of the association to fill the vacancy until the next annual general meeting, subject to the following,

- (a) If the vacancy occurs to a management committee member who was originally proposed by a SAFA affiliated club, then the vacancy is to be filled by a replacement member proposed by that club,
- (b) in the event that the SAFA affiliated club is unable or unwilling to propose a replacement management committee member within 30 days of the vacancy occurring then the remaining members on the management committee may appoint another member of the association to fill the vacancy.

The President called for a vote and Special Resolution 2 was passed unanimously.

- 9. Post AGM Meeting Admin: The following tasks arising from this AGM were identified as follows:
 - President/Treasurer/Secretary to identify & sign off any required forms (JV, AH & PR)
 - Prepare OOFT annual report and associated docs & lodge (PR)
 - Prepare OOFT docs confirming the passing of Special Resolution 1 and Special Resolution 2 and lodge (PR, PG, JV)
 - Send QSA Annual Report to SAFA (PG)

10. General Business:

- QSA Growth initiatives discussion & commitment:
 - o Expand the Committee of Management as per Special Resolution 2
 - Identify key State/Regional stakeholders for our sport and develop/implement engagement strategy
 - Introduce Remote Member category for individuals resident more than 300KM from their nearest QSA affiliated club site (will need a special resolution at a general meeting) or e.g. where it is impractical because of distance to join a club.
 - Research new club opportunities & strategise for implementation for the Wide Bay, CQ and western Qld corridor
 - Seek support to conduct 2 SAFA displays at local agricultural shows in the QSA area of operation in 2021
 - Identify projects to assist affiliated clubs at the regional level and commence the process to seek funding opportunities from state level authorities for same.

Moved: Paul Green that this matter be included for discussion at the first available Management Committee meeting following OOFT approval of the constitutional amendments and recruitment of the new committee members for QSA. **Seconded:** Paul Reilly and carried.
